Pastor's Ponderings

The Advent of our Lord...The arrival of our Lord!

The arrivals I have experienced are sometimes prepared for and expected, and other times they are a surprise. Some arrivals are positive, and one looks forward to them, and others bring dread or worry. Some arrivals are on time, and some are late or even early.

Well, the arrival of our Lord, the advent of our Lord, that we remember, anticipate, and celebrate for 4 weeks before Christmas is coming too quickly for me this year. I do not feel ready. My mind, heart, and spirit still need to get in line with the joy and hopefulness of Jesus's coming. Maybe you feel the same way?

One of my favorite Bible verses is from 1st Peter 3:15 in which the author challenges Jesus' followers, servants of the Lord, disciples like you and me, to "Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence."

It is difficult to "always" be ready and prepared. My readiness ebbs and flows, but it feels like our Lord's arrival is sure. Therefore to acknowledge it, and focus on what that means for us, is our calling for Advent.

In a kind of circular way, I got to what Advent is all about. LOVE.

May God's Love shine in and through you this Advent season.

Our gift to *God's Global Barnyard* includes a variety of the following:

Chicks: their eggs not only provide an ongoing supply of protein-rich meals — they can also help start a small business and generate a steady source of income.

Rooster: More chickens on the farm mean more eggs to eat and sell at the market.

Honeybees: Honeybees provide honey to eat, beeswax that allows a farmer to start a small business selling their products, and a boost to crop growth by pollinating plants everywhere they go.

Piglet: This gift is a source of natural fertilizer that helps crops grow tall and strong, and can also be sold at the market for extra income when it's needed.

Goat: Goat's milk provides nutrition for children and their families, and goats are quick to reproduce — which means a family can pass this life-saving gift onto others.

There is a similar program that offers bicycles to refugees, so they will share our information with those they help, and we will do the same for them.

We are so very thankful to Lutheran Charities and our congregation for their and your help and support.

This month, I was invited to speak with three English as a Second Language (ESL) classes in Buffalo. I shared our program: offering learning permit classes, assistance/support in any way we are able, and monetary assistance for their learner permit and ten professional driving lessons with Stevens Driving School (which also includes the required five-hour course and the road test).

Two of the students in these classes were also students of the Learner Permit classes we held this past summer. Both passed their learner permit tests and one of them has received his driver license! The other student should begin driving lessons soon. Very exciting!

Details from the first link, Middle East Crisis:

Due to escalating conflict in Gaza and Israel, a severe humanitarian crisis is rapidly unfolding in the Holy Land. The ELCA has a longstanding relationship with partners in the region, including the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and Augusta Victoria Hospital. Lutheran Disaster Response has a history of providing support for our partners and will be prepared to answer calls for assistance when the time comes.

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has issued a letter of solidarity to Bishop Dr. Sani-Ibrahim Azar of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. In it, she writes,

"I encourage the people of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to unite in prayer for the families of innocent civilians whose lives were lost, as well as pray for healing for all the injured, fearful and traumatized.

"I pledge our accompaniment and support to you as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and its ministries provide 'critical and timely assistance (psychological and otherwise) to those affected by this war."

What you can do: Please pray for people in the Middle East who have been impacted by the conflict. May God's healing presence give them peace and hope in their time of need.

















CHRISTIAN CANCER SUPPORT: Hope and Healing
